



"...whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

Philippians 4:8

It seems like every week there's another headline about the deleterious effects of social media and electronic devices. Many of us who are above forty simply shake our heads when we hear about declining mental and social health of tech-dependent teenagers. It's worth asking whether we are also adversely impacted in ways that appeal more to our generations, as well as whether we are setting good examples for younger adults.

One area Christians are discussing today is electronic news and political commentary. Back when people had to subscribe to printed periodicals to receive news and commentaries, the logistics limited how much we could access. While we may know a lot of print newspapers have closed down, the aggressive tactics of online news vendors aren't as well-known. Many e-news companies purchase consumer information from tech companies and target those they think will pay for their services. Unlike printed newspapers, there's no incentive to reach a wide audience. The more partisan and in some cases distorted - their products are, the more people tend to subscribe. Large electronic news outlets even use algorithms to choose which stories to promote on your device. Since ad revenue increases when people respond to alerts news alerts are worded in extreme ways designed to generate outrage and fear. Add talk radio and twenty-four-hour TV news, youtube channels and partisan efforts like NewsMax and YoungTurks, and you have multiple, constant flows of news and information. The "Outrage Industrial Complex" is conservatively estimated to generate over \$200,000,000,000.00 each year in the United States alone.

Aside from the political divisions these unethical companies help to feed, daily exposure to this new kind of "news" literally damages human brains. The American Psychiatric Association electronic now recognizes news and commentary "addiction" as a widespread problem and provides treatment. When functioning in a healthy way, cortisone helps our brains determine dangerous situations, powers our competitions, and motivates us to get things done. Just like overuse of social media, constant political input boosts cortisone to unhealthy levels. Periodic outbursts of indignation cause spikes that our brains begin to crave as forms of quiet simulation. No matter how intelligent, kind, or disciplined a person may be, no brain can stand up to constant input designed to upset us without adverse effects.


The Christian researcher Ryan Burge compares the average level of news and political intake today to "drinking from a fire hose." He limits himself to three full articles, thirty minutes of scanning, and one news update each day. Others notice that churchgoing Christians often show some of the most distorted views of the world in national polls. Despite rapidly declining crime rates - especially murder - they insist crime is increasing (always communities). Despite significantly higher household income relative to expenses, they insist the economy is worse than even a few years ago. Despite major court decisions expanding the rights of Christians, they insist they're under attack, "oppressed," and vilified. None of these views capture the reality or complexity of U.S. Christianity during a time of religious decline.

The big takeaway from overconsumption of news generated to induce visceral reactions is that many Christians aren't prepared to take on real ministry, let alone serve as an effective witness to the Gospel. If we think of Christians as a baseball team, then it's crucial the team know the layout of the diamond. Different fields can need different lengths to hit a home run. Some teams have superstar shortstops, others have exceptional players on first base. If we only


and always see every diamond as nothing but treacherous traps, we'll certainly lose.

In contrast, God wants to equip us for Kingdom work. God calls us to worship and read the Bible partly in order to speak back to the pernicious voices that can demoralize and disincentivize us. The Bible constantly reminds us that we are all spiritual brothers and sisters, not enemies engaged in vicious "culture wars." In order to engage people in a Christian manner we must begin with a Christian mindset. This means saying "no" to the things that disrupt and demoralize us in order to say "yes" to Christian ministry. Especially as a presidential election comes around again, our faith is put to the test in how we interact with persons who hold political positions different from our own. The news media we swim in today portrays that as a lifeor-death struggle that requires forbearance and falseness. The reality of God's created world is that befriending and supporting those who are different is one of the greatest blessings in life. We think we are doing it for the other person when we actually gain the greatest spiritual benefit. In the words of Jesus, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

What Is an RMD?

As conversations about the annual Pledge Campaign and the separate Capital Campaign have started, a number of retired members have asked about Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs). Because everyone's situation is different, it's impossible to provide guidance to individuals; these questions are best answered by financial planners and fund advisors. This article is a general introduction. It's not enough to make a decision about handling retirement income, though hopefully it can help people to ask questions of financial professionals.

Many retirement plans are subject to RMDs, including employer-sponsored 401(K) and 403(b) plans, after you retire (and if still working often at age 72). This means you cannot withdraw below a certain amount from these plans each year, though the amount varies based on several factors. When the RMD is higher than your expenses, a portion of retirement income is often taxed at the highest level possible. The important thing to know is that if you donate to an approved charity (such as the church) directly from the plan, that donation is tax-deductible. This is true even when your total charitable deductions don't reach the threshold to claim deductions or to warrant itemizing your tax return. The key point is that if you receive retirement income from your plan, then donate to a charity as a second step, there is no tax deduction allowed. The payment must be arranged directly from your plan/plan management company to the charity in order to receive the deduction on your taxes.

Again, each person's situation is different, but this may allow both more savings and increased charitable donations. For example, let's say you fall within the 22% nominal federal tax bracket, and you donate \$8,000.00 to the church or another qualified organization. If that's taxed at the nominal rate of 22%, then \$1,760.00 in taxes is paid by you on that donated money. On the other hand, if you arrange to have the \$8,000 paid directly to the charity, you save that \$1,760.00 - it becomes deductible even from your RMD. If you wouldn't miss that amount in taxes, you could then increase the amount paid to the charity considerably. Or you could keep 50% of the tax savings and increase the amount of the donation by 50%. Remember, this follows tax law as it was intended to be used. When the 2017 tax reforms removed the benefits most Americans enjoyed through charitable giving, exemptions like this one were included to encourage more generosity. This isn't a loophole, but a targeted exemption to help communities support the causes that are important to them.

The above example was simpler and more straightforward than applies to many people - again, please speak with someone with training in this area before making decisions yourself. Yet it may be helpful to know there is a way to maximize your giving (and your saving). A famous quote from John Wesley (co-founder of modern Methodism) applies here: "Earn all you can... and save all you can... so that you can give all you can!"

Per Capita Reminder



We have reached the last quarter of the year when the church makes our final payment of FORGET! our per capita to the Presbytery of the Genesee Valley who are there to serve us in many ways. Recently, they have assisted our-Capital Campaign Team and have provided a grant to the Puppet Ministry. In the past they have provided information and support for finding our interim pastor and our installed Pastor Kirk. Per capita also funds the Synod

of the Northeast and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A).

This church will pay \$6,522.00 in per capita for 2024 which is based on the number of members of the church. By the end of August \$2,310.75 in per capita contributions have been received from the congregation this year. If you have not yet paid yours, or are paying quarterly, the 2024 per capita is \$36.85 per member (or \$9.22 per guarter). If you pay by check. write per capita on the memo line because the contribution is in addition to your 2024 pledge. When members pay their per capita it means the funds do not have to be taken from another line of our budget.
