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

OUR FAITH IN ACTION

For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their

Some years ago a parent complained jokingly that while their teen child had come back from serving food to homeless diners shocked and grateful, the effect soon wore off. "I was proud when he said how a conversation with a homeless man opened his eyes and made him realize how good his life is," the parent explained. "After only about a week, he was complaining his phone was too old, the internet is too slow, and he wants a new video game!" At the time, I laughed along with the parent. These days that conversation has taken on deeper meaning as stories of parents' concerns over their children's ingratitude, poor social skills, and sometimes demands of financial support late into adulthood. become more common.

We know how to raise compassionate, grateful, caring kids who will work hard to build lives for themselves. The answer isn't an annual trip to help at a free meal program or homeless shelter; it's regular, sustained involvement in helping those less fortunate. If we want people in our lives to be more thoughtful, understanding, and self-sufficient, the one, proven path for nearly everyone is to volunteer with a program that serves people they don't know on a regular basis - ideally, every week, but at least once each month. That parent who was so disappointed the impact of a youth mission outing didn't last could have benefitted from knowing that infrequent service projects would never have a lasting effect.

The irony is that as our society has become wealthier we've also become more obsessed with wealth and the ability to generate it. In the American middle class, parenting success is based almost entirely on suitability for college and earnings after graduation. Even the phrase "get into a good college" is a euphemism for life?'" Mark 8:34b-36

acceptance at a school that is known to land high-paying jobs (Hurst, Amplified Advantage, 2019). Also consider recent choices we've made as a society. Selling marijuana for "recreational use" is now legal in New York State because it's expected to generate sizable tax revenue, the well-documented despite damage recreational marijuana inflicts on families and communities. Colleges sell student email lists to sports betting companies, who hope they can hook college students for life. Gun manufacturers have written recent gun laws through the NRA even as schools have become common locations for mass shootings. The common message all these changes send is that children don't matter unless they are making profit for someone else.

Yet the very activities that produce candidates for a "good college" are those that eclipse the ones that form character, strength, and empathy. One of the best ways to share faith with children from age eleven onward is through shared acts of Christian service research shows that has more impact than praying together, studying the Bible together, or talking about faith during teen years (though all do help - Powell & Clark, Sticky Faith, 2011).

The answer is so simple, yet it seems impossible for many parents to fit regular Christian service into their jam-packed schedules. On the one hand, this is because today's parents are only judged by their ability to produce attractive college applicants, not on how kind or caring their children may be. On the other hand, it's because parents are stretched thinly between two time-intensive careers. Employers have been given enormous power over their employees relative to the 1970s, and this creates so much stress that the Surgeon General recently declared parenting to be "bad" for your health.

I wish there were an easy answer; adults my age and older often act as if young parents can simply choose to not enroll children in various activities, but between the norms of children's peer groups (which encourage children to want to be over-scheduled) and the unrealistic demands of employment, parents don't have as many choices as we once did. They need places for their children to be during extended work hours, so arguing with teenagers that they're too busy becomes difficult, if not impossible.

If we follow Jesus' example, we might push back on schools and employers instead. We could ask both to consider their impacts on families. Armed with some of the vast amounts of information available about how problems like hyper-scheduling, relentless adult supervision, and "workism" harm parents and children, we can suggest schools and employers adopt healthier practices. We can listen when young parents speak of the pressures they face. And we can prayerfully consider how to make our faith community different, one that seeks to alleviate demands on busy families rather than demand that church become one more item on a full calendar. I suspect this is the kind of approach Jesus would take, and we are, after all, the Body of Christ.



Worship In January

As we start the new year, we continue to follow the Lectionary, with occasional detours for local church observances such as the ordination and installation of Church Officers on January 5. The Revised Common Lectionary is a three-year cycle of readings over common among Protestant denominations. The first "common" (shared") lectionary was developed in the early days of Protestantism to ensure that Bible passages that explicated Protestant teachings were included. The Lectionary was designed to include a broad selection of Bible passages. Today the Lectionary is hard for many to follow due to decreased familiarity with the Holy Bible.
